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General Information

Presented in this report are results from the exit survey.

Exit Survey: The exit survey collects information regarding the graduates' current employment status, future educational plans, their achievement of specific goals and Excelsior College's impact on those goals, their level of satisfaction with the College, importance and satisfaction with resources provided at Excelsior College, their achievement of general education outcomes, and achievement of the program's student learning outcomes. The survey also solicits graduates' perceptions of program strengths and suggestions for change.

Questions related to the exit survey or to the design and production of this report may be addressed to the Director of Institutional Effectiveness.

Interpreting Results: Care should be taken in interpreting survey results. Survey results can be affected by self-selection bias, in which persons with certain characteristics or opinions are more likely to respond. Particular caution should be taken when the numbers of responses are small because results may be skewed.

Please consider the following guidelines when interpreting survey data:

Means: When results are expressed in a chart or table of means, please note the range of values and their meanings, which are listed in a footnote below the chart or table. In general, mean values of 4 or higher on a 6-point Likert scale are considered positive. Similarly, a mean value of 5 or higher is considered positive on a 7-point scale. Throughout the report, means are calculated only for Likert-type items that received five or more responses.

Standard deviations: Wherever mean values are presented, please also consider the standard deviations (SD) that accompany them. Standard deviation is a measure of variability in the response to a survey item, such that a small SD indicates less variation (more agreement) among respondents.

Frequency tables: As noted above, means are calculated only for Likert-type items that received five or more responses. If fewer than five were received, responses will be displayed in frequency tables, with a numerical count provided for each response. Where charts display survey items in pairs (such as ratings of program outcomes), both items will be displayed in a frequency table if either received fewer than five responses.

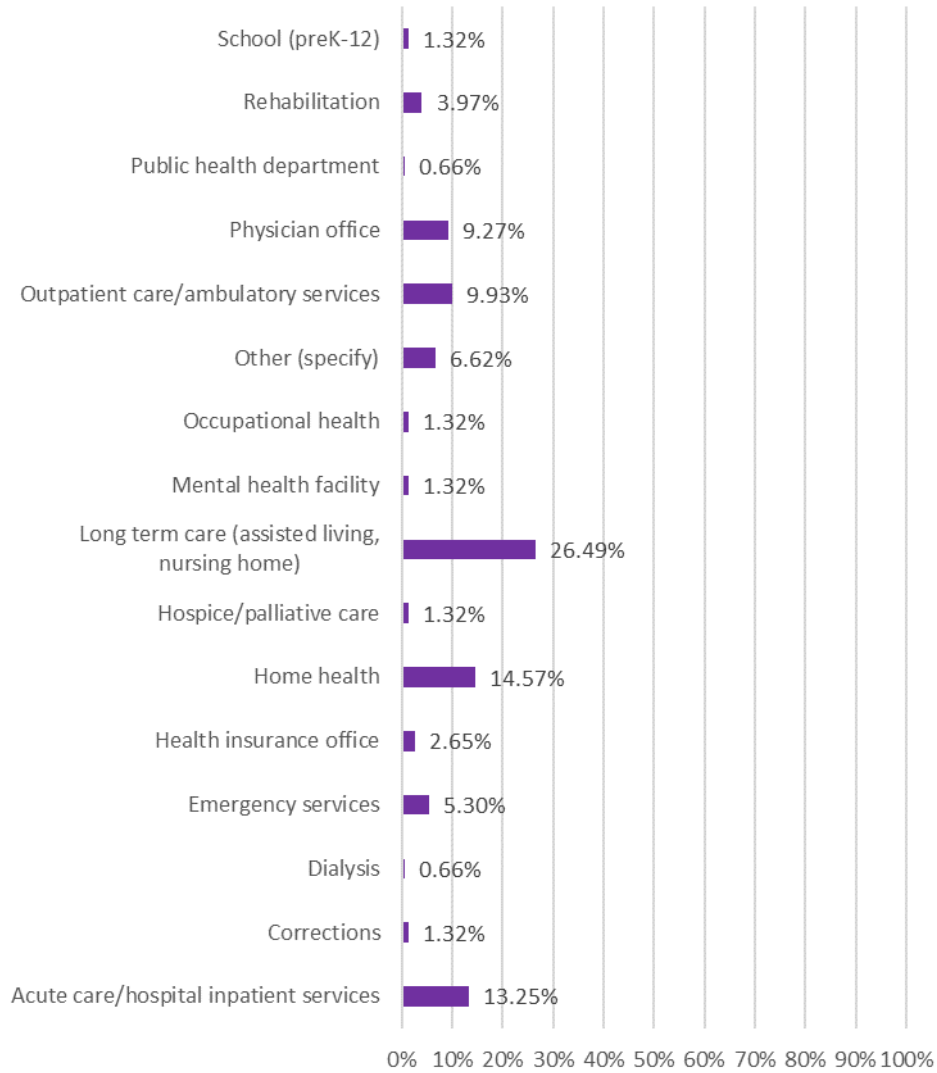

In which of the following health care settings do you currently work? (N = 151)



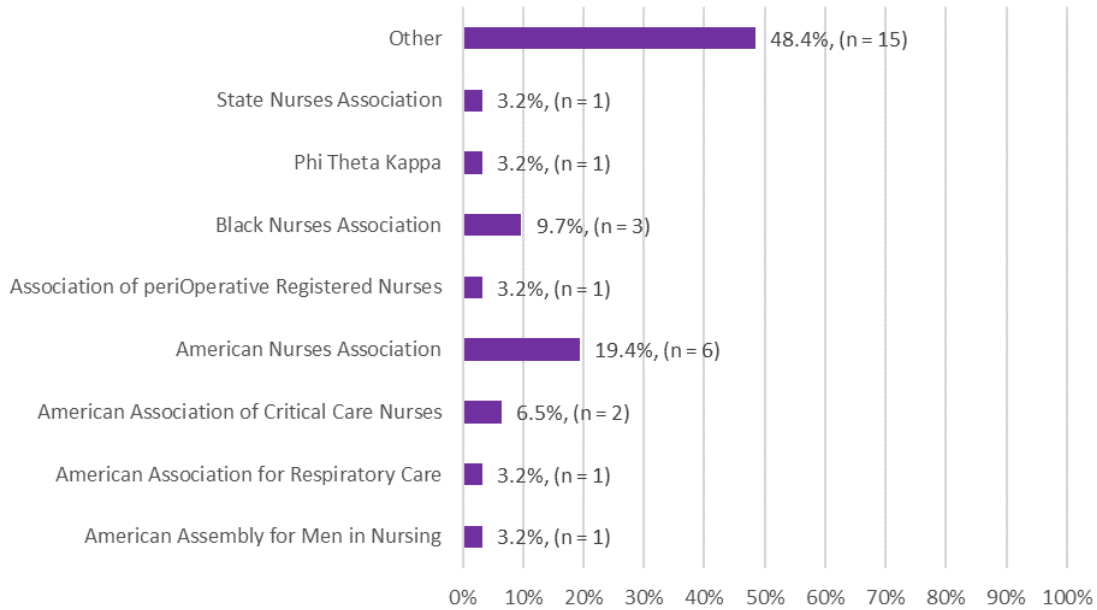

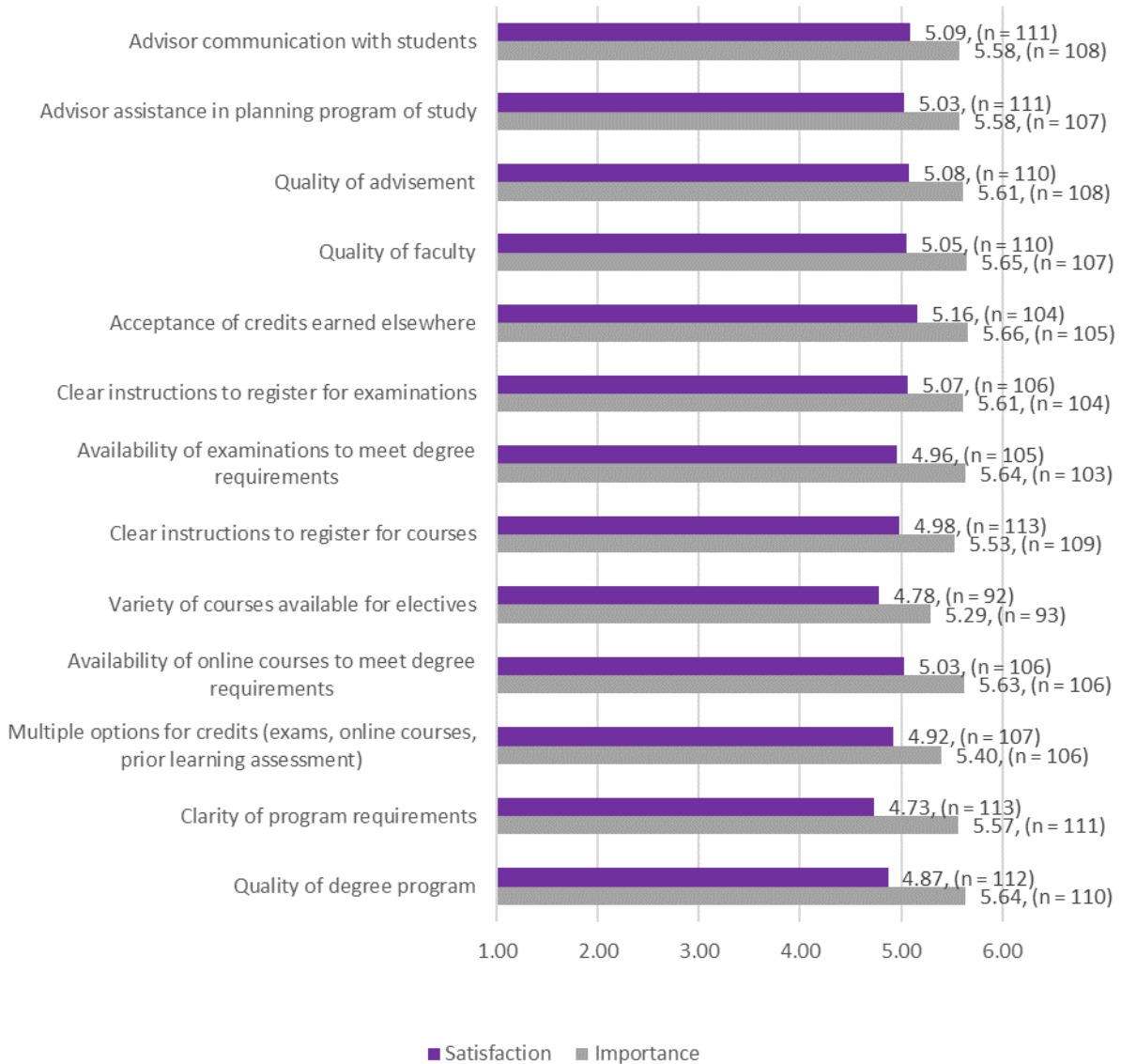

Please indicate how **important** each aspect of the Excelsior College experience was to you and how **satisfied** you were with it. (Mean ratings)

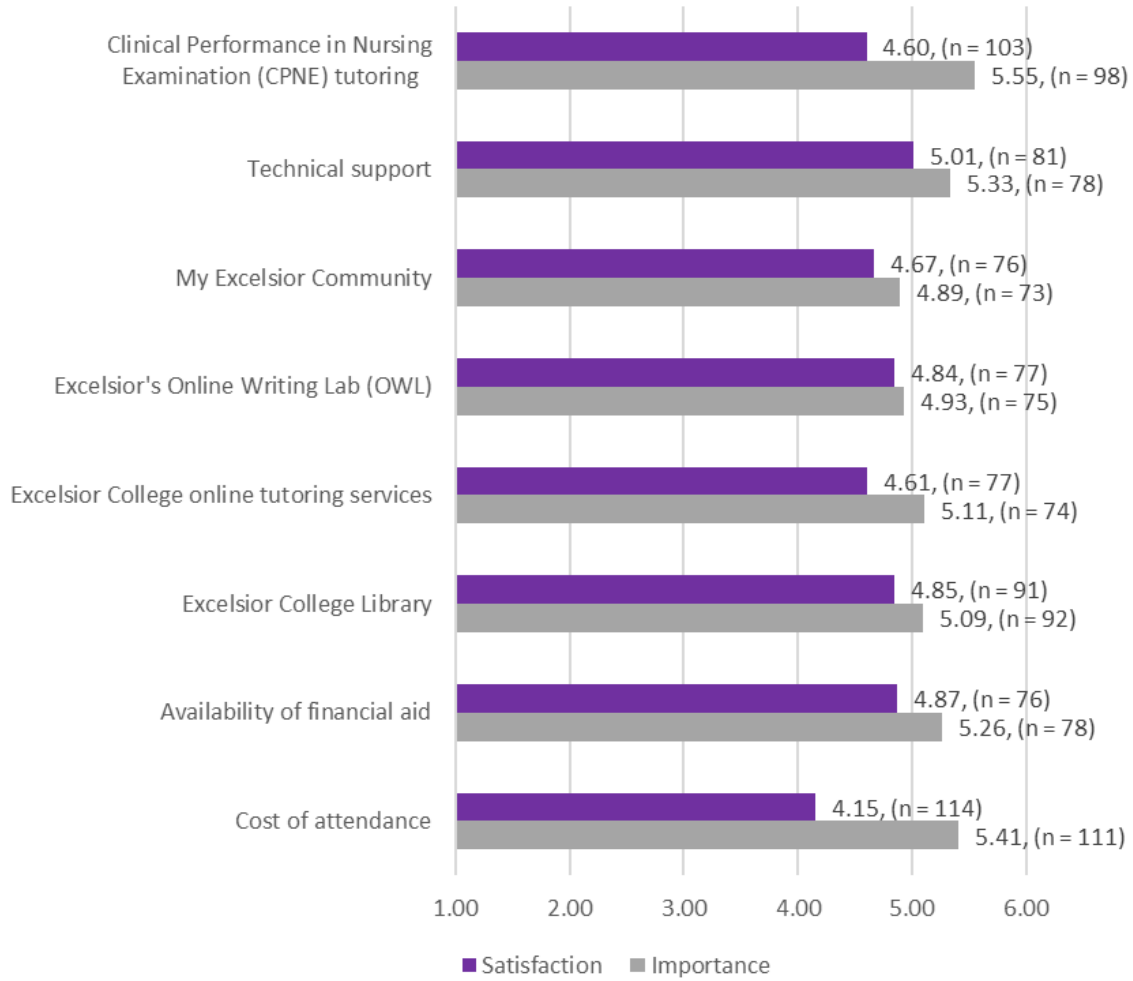

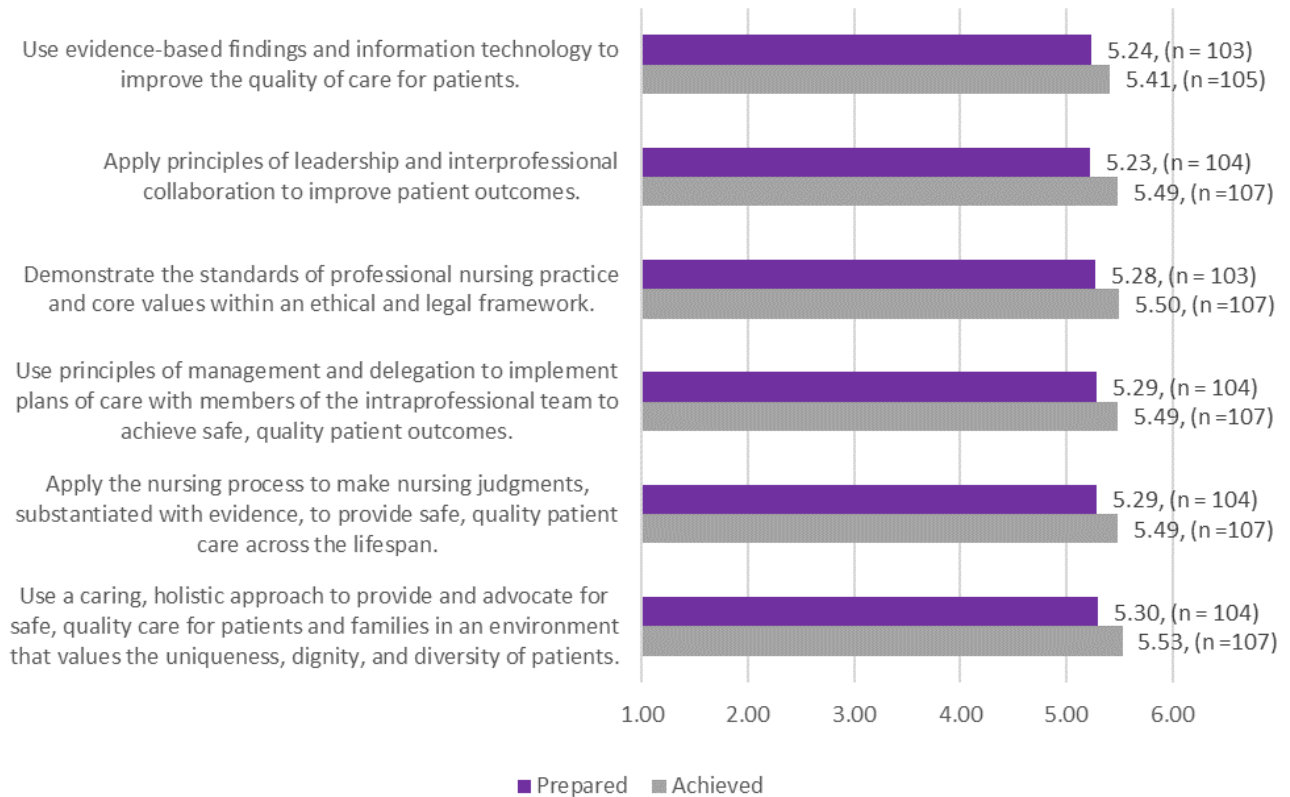

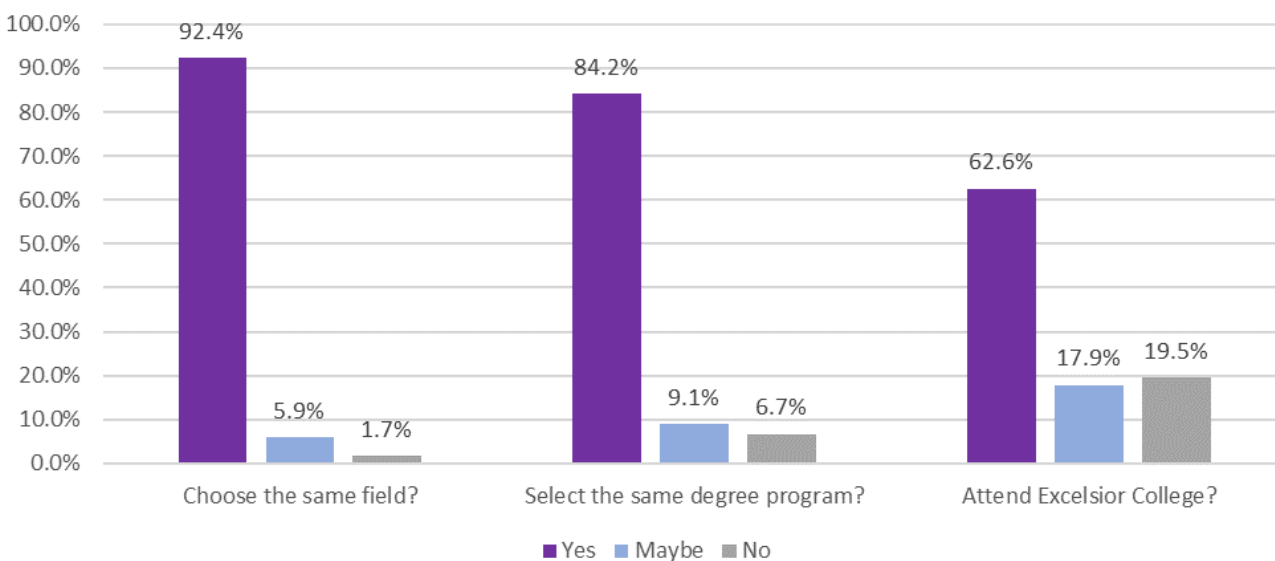

Comments:

- I would highly recommend lowering tuition and regaining ACEN accreditation.
- You have already done it !! The CPNE was the most stressful thing I've ever done. I'd rather run a trauma code in a burning house!! I understand the information and testing of the CPNE will be integrated into the eight test in the future. This will be a great improvement in the program. A program that i could recommend.
- Addition of some required clinical experiences specific to each course during or after completion of content.
- More clarification on using the ati program. It was very confusing to use
- Faculty to be more involved in teaching material
- The frustration I have experienced with the program came at the end. There is little guidance for the BON application process once we have graduated. And technically, for being an online school, I find there is a lack of communication and updating to the school website. Many links we are sent to school pages come up as can't be found or state the student doesn't have access. This feels disorganized for an "online school". The pandemic has certainly challenged the release of information, and students are not updated accordingly to the rapid changes we all were experiencing (specifically to the dates/extensions for the virtual CPNE part of the program).
- Instructors need to remember what is is to be an educator and not focused on failing students.
- I think the new CPN format is great, it would be awesome if somehow you could keep that as part of the program. Giving students the option of going in person or the online way. For me for example, saved me tons of money because I did not have to travel and find a place for my kid and my dogs to stay while I attended the CPNE. It removed an huge amount of stress and financial burden on my family.
- Keep going strong!
- additional support for nursing courses and more available clinical locations
- Losing the ACEN accreditation was a big deal and blow to the credibility of the degree program. I am so glad that I graduated under the umbrella of the ACEN. This will make job finding much easier state to state as we PCS often.

- Have better advisors who answer emails clearly communicate program changes and not keep students in the dark
- Consistency with what is expected was lacking. The nursing classes were great, requirements that followed were not! When asking questions to faculty members, responses were not consistent, very vague, or simply not answered at all. This adds increased stress & anxiety to an already high stress CPNE experience. Students simply hope for a fair CE or CA. The standards are extremely high, (which is understandable) however to achieve it seems to be by the subjective feelings of the faculty assessing your ability. The CPNE should not be a pass/fail exam. There is entirely too much perfection to achieve over multiple days. It felt as if the exam was more about how you handled the extreme pressure of it, rather than your ability to perform the task.
- Make the communication better about when to register for the CPNE
- Give closer attention to the online students especially while in the nursing or other programs virtually as they can really get stuck while working at home alone eg schedule more tutoring for help
- Meet requirements for ADN to be accepted in all states.
- More Sims labs for class prep
- Losing national certification, means that Nevada citizens can not take this nursing courses at Excelsior.
- More oral communication
- Excelsior needs to learn to move with the times faster and smooth through the feedback of its students. My biggest disappointment with this school was being able to get my classes done in less than 2 years only to have to wait over a year to do my final exam with poor guidance toward doing so with a new program. In addition to having to take my final through a new system, I was guided through with CA and CE that had never used the system themselves but were the ones deciding if the system was grading us correctly. This led to taking my final twice at the additional cost on myself because I was failed on a pt over allegedly not looking at an extremity that would have been impossible not to with the previous assessment steps done in the scenario. I understand that Covid-19 caused a lot of adjustment in school as with many other aspects of life. However, a school with an already lengthy wait time for their final exam should not have waited until the summer to find an online solution to getting the final exam done. Additionally, once the solution of a virtual exam was found, CAs and CEs should have been required to attempt the scenarios being used to recognize deficiencies in the program prior to a student taking their exams to avoid penalizing student of points that a person could clearly evaluate as computer system limitations.

- To actually have a syllabus instead of buy all these books and best of luck attitude. To actually have some direction. To be better at CPNE instructions and communications.
- The ATI requirement is absurd. I do not feel like it is preparing me for boards as I do not learn with busy work. I'd rather spend time using resources that are beneficial to my learning needs instead of wasting time with ATI so I can actually prepare for boards.
- Overpricing
- First and foremost, the college should address their accreditation issue! Most states will not accept degrees from non-accredited colleges. Secondly, there should be a dosage calculation class as well as some form of IV class if possible. I don't even care if the instructor shows the student virtually how to perform the tasks, it is something that should be highly considered. Third, the cost of attending is extremely expensive. This is very important for single parents who are attending the program! Please consider adjusting the cost of tuition! Lastly, the college should also consider allowing students to attend clinicals at hospitals in their area who will accept them having an assigned preceptor for the convenience of single parents who can't afford the cost of travel, hotel accommodations, and etc.
- Maybe reach out to the entities that don't approve of online learning and present all the pros if possible.
- Making the courses more affordable to students
- Lessen the wait time from when a student finishes courses to the CPNE exams.
- Well the Virtual CPNE Clinical was well put together I do commend those that implemented for the students to reach their goals as a RN.
- The CPNE was tough and I think the new set up will show these regulatory boards just how amazing the school is. Excelsior has an amazing and professional group of nursing educators that genuinely care about the students. I'm excited to see good things happen for the school and students in the future.
- Increase the number of sites for clinical and reduce clinical wait times. Allow students to participate in clinical sites in their local states. Allow clinicals to be more than an exam (i.e., CPNE). Incorporate other educational experiences to determine students' clinical competencies. Stop requiring students to participate in your NCLEX prep courses via ATI. Make it optional, not a mandate.

- Communication from staff and the credit by exam outlines were definitely subpar
- Opportunity for skills practices. Continuous program accessibility to a simulation program to reach a set benchmark for assessment and skills practice.
- I personally feel adding the simulators was a good idea and am happy to see that they will be utilized more.
- Most of the exams and quizzes has spelling and grammatical errors that made it either difficult to decipher what the question was asking, or changed the answers so none were correct to select.
- A more successful, transition to the completion of the nursing program. Without a two year waiting period between the theory courses and the CPNE.
- Get rid of the CPNE. Period.
- The virtual practice sims for the virtual PCS didn't prepare for actual test 100%. The actual test should have been closer to what was being practiced.
- Eliminate all those UNNECESSARY fees. Everytime I pay for one unnecessary thing, another one comes up. After paying thousands of dollars to Excelsior over the years, you turned around and charged me another \$500 to send me my diploma. Smh.
- More videos and hands on type learning
- No changes- the instructors were greatest asset !
- The Nclex prep course is good, but I shouldn't have to do another course for 12 weeks after I finished my program. That is way too much
- Give more hands on clinical experience not just for a test but clinical hours.
- Assist the student more academically. To much self preparation. There needs to be more communication between student and teachers .
- More contact when registration is due, find out why students are skipping a semester.
- Omit CPNE and ATI. I find the ATI NCLEX to be very stressful.

- Unfortunately with the loss of the Accreditation, the difficulty I had with my ATI coach, the numerous faculty members that I had that were less than "welcoming". The CPNE being virtual and testing while working during a pandemic, this was beyond stressful.
- Provide more contact from Nursing school faculty with students
- More CPNE locations, southeast.
- to become accredited again. most recommendations i make to attend excelsior to colleagues to attend excelsior are not considered related to the withdrawal of accreditation
- .unsure at this time
- Gain accreditation again. Establish a more efficient way to sign the passport size photos. I mailed mine to the instructed address, with attention to the dean's office, but never received them back.
- Professors that give grades just to give them and do not follow their own rubric.
- Cpne needs different scoring. To expect a nursing student done completely online to either pass/fail is stressful. Passing that test is memorizing the handbook, not learning.
- Actually have people at the school that can help when you have a question or concern. Give better direction for CPNE. Students have to basically learn the information on their own.
- An Actual class for the CPNE for getting ready for. That is a very stressful thing. Being prepared by knowing documentation and presentation is what helped pass. I did not like excelsior CPNE prep I was lost and confused.
- Accreditation
- "Timing on the NSL lab competency final exam. I understand that every Instructor has their own way of teaching but I would like to encourage the online nursing instructors to be more present during the course. Two of the nursing instructors were excellent in their teaching. They made zoom video presentations, they sent PowerPoint reviews for the exams, they share their jobs experiences, they advised and prepared the students to pass the course. I think they made the online course like a traditional course. That's the way I want to be if I become an Instructor.
- "An 8 week, tutoring weekly class that consists of a 3 or 4 hour lecture/review and weekly practice quizzes to assist students to stay on track in the self study, one final exam option. Also the long wait time for the CPNE was not in the students corner, it's stretched out the time from

learning, remembering and retaining information far too long by the time a student can graduate and have to review all of the information for the NCLEX. I'm under the impression the CPNE is being replaced with a different procedure.

- Clearer guidance on program changes. I kept getting inaccurate information emails that did not apply to me and caused unnecessary worry about my program requirements.
- Be more specific about the cost and ALL charges/payments the student will need to put forth in order to graduate. Do this early in the students' college career.
- [I was a transfer from the Achieve program.] The Excelsior program is by far the better program. However, Achieve offered a weekly live 3 hour lecture, than students could type a question in on. That was very beneficial. I would also suggest a contract revision with ATI, and mandate students to begin practicing NCLEX questions much sooner.
- Everything felt like a muddled mess. There was no clear direction, websites were difficult to navigate, you lost accreditation in the middle of the program, costs for testing were very high, typical faculty were unhelpful. Overall, I feel as though the training was poor & I feel very lacking for going into my career field, despite the fact that I diligently studied & passed each course. I felt as though I made it through this course entirely of my own determination & despite the school, instead of because of the school helping me succeed. Very disappointed with the entire process and would never recommend it to a friend. I am ashamed to tell people where I got my degree from now, because you're not even accredited any longer. Such a disappointment when I should be proud of my accomplishment. Even now, as I await my NCLEX, I have had to go back & forth with staff repeatedly trying to get them to send the necessary documentation to my states board of nursing. They keep insisting a program completion letter is not required, despite the boards website saying it is & speaking directly with the board & them saying it is a requirement, staff still does not want to send the letter.
- The nursing courses need to be longer. Eight weeks is not enough time to absorb that much information. Honestly who has time to read that much and work full time plus take care of a family. Excelsior should be helping the students more. The faculty needs more interaction with the students. In NUR 275 we had weekly zoom meetings and we would have discussions. That facilitates the learning process. Discussion online writing alone is not enough. The faculty could also post important highlights from the readings. Maybe some important notes. For the amount of money we're paying we shouldn't be teaching ourselves.
- Get nursing accreditation back
- Uexcel for nursing

- Clarifying correct medication book for the CPNE. My CA told me that we were to use the Davis drug book and that's not clearly stated on the rules of CPNE. Says to use most up to date. Graduation fee was a bit steep considering the diploma came in a folder and not a more fancy flip up display folder. Could have added the nursing pin in for that fee. We earned it considering the amount of money spent in courses/exams.
- Not require the ATI or at least explain more about that during the duration of the course. It 's hard to jump into something like that when you are busy with life. Figuring out how to use the website is discouraging.
- The loss of accreditation 1/2 thru my degree is causing me issues. In addition the lack of communication regarding what to do list-graduation. Plus, having to wait over two months before degree conferred and still having to wait for everything to reach the board.
- Get back NLN(or whatever it's called now) certification.
- I would like to see Excelsior College release the nursing student from the ATI Testing before they will release them for taking state boards. I'd like to see it as a choice not mandatory. This affords the student the opportunity to study at their own pace and in the best way they study & learn.
- I believe they have since implemented the change. As far as the clinical and testing out of a course. Not knowing how Online schooling works can become very challenging. One can lose momentum and focus quickly. However, If you're constantly in contact with an advisor or have to check in I believe there would be a higher success rate.
- Shorter times to complete the CPNE and complete the CPNE, I do bear some responsibility as I failed the first attempt however I think having the wait time be 6 months or less would be much better for students overall ability to enter the profession or nursing sooner.
- Being more open and available to the students in how to get to navigate the cpne
- Additional hands on, but my experience was limited due to Covid
