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General Information

This report presents results from the one-year survey.

One-year Survey: The one-year survey collects information regarding the graduates' satisfaction with Excelsior University, their future educational plans, current educational, employment, and income status, achievement of program outcomes, and the impact that the educational process has had on career and educational goals. The survey also solicits graduates' perceptions of program strengths and suggestions for change, as well as the most important impact earning an Excelsior University degree has had on their lives.

Questions related to the survey or to the design and production of this report may be addressed to the Director of Institutional Effectiveness.

Interpreting Results: Care should be taken in interpreting survey results. Survey results can be affected by self-selection bias, in which persons with certain characteristics or opinions are more likely to respond. Particular caution should be taken when the numbers of responses are small because results may be skewed.

Please consider the following guidelines when interpreting survey data:

<u>Means:</u> When results are expressed in a chart or table of means, please note the range of values and their meanings, which are listed in a footnote below the chart or table. In general, mean values of 4 or higher on a 6-point Likert scale are considered positive. Similarly, a mean value of 5 or higher is considered positive on a 7-point scale. Throughout the report, means are calculated only for Likert-type items that received five or more responses.

<u>Standard deviations:</u> Wherever mean values are presented, please also consider the standard deviations (SD) that accompany them. Standard deviation is a measure of variability in the response to a survey item, such that a small SD indicates less variation (more agreement) among respondents.

<u>Frequency tables:</u> As noted above, means are calculated only for Likert-type items that received five or more responses. If fewer than five were received, responses will be displayed in frequency tables, with a numerical count provided for each response. Where charts display survey items in pairs (such as ratings of program outcomes), both items will be displayed in a frequency table if either received fewer than five responses.

The graduation dates appearing on the cover of this report represent the requested report period. The dates appearing in the Sample section on page 2 indicate the range of graduation dates among actual survey respondents.



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





- (The very few instructors that weren't pleasant, already found their way out...or will. I tend to
 think that respectful, kind, professional staff are kept at EU)
 I'm a Jersey Shore (old) girl. I have recommended several LPNs to the program, some have
 finished already. We have several large teaching hospital systems (multiple choices of transit,
 airports, etc.)
 - MY BIG SUGGESTION: partner with an NJ hospital system...both parties my benefit!!
- A greater emphasis on clinical instruction through the use of Zoom which I believe has already been undertaken since my graduation.
- Add ATI throughout the program instead of giving it the end. ATI helped me learn the topics much better.
- Clinical Experience
- Everything. You lost your accreditation just prior to my graduation. Clinicals were via zoom. We were not prepared for the NCLEX RN which I have taken 4 times unsuccessfully and now have no job as a result.
- Get rid of the nursing program.
- It took me a while to get my course completed due to have three kids and always working full time so when I was SURPRISED at the end of my clinicals saying I had to complete a course with ATI NCLEX in order to get my records sent to the Ohio Board of Nursing. The course was more than I could squeeze into my life, which is why I chose online schooling to begin with. This was not discussed with me along the way and resulted in almost a year till I took and passed my NCLEX RN. I also PAID TO GET MY RESULT EXPEDITED which was not told this would nt help. Other than that i liked the program but this left a sour taste in my mouth as i worked a longtime to get there only to be given a piece of paper saying that was required after thinking was done.
- It's strength are also its weakness. I felt no connection to the school or the program. I simply felt like I was alone with very little guidance stumbling through the program with little direction or sense of purpose. After the first exam in which I read the entire recommended readings, all 1000+ pages, I realized that completion using that model was not sustainable. After that I used a third party exam guide that dropped the reading to 100-150 pages and was able to pass. There is FAR too much fluff and nice to know info in the nursing degree program. Other than greatly expanded pharmacology I learned nothing that I didn't already know from being a Paramedic. As a practicing RN in the Urgent Care I have NEVER used ADPIE, nursing diagnostic statements or care plans. What I have used are the skills I learned in Paramedic school and the drug reference manual until I became familiar with the commonly used drugs in the UC setting. Nursing school could have been a pharm class and study for the NCLEX and I would have gotten the same out of it and saved thousands of dollars and years of time.
